hosts the Cluster of Excellence "Beyond Slavery and Freedom", which aims to overcome the binary opposition of "slavery versus freedom". We approach the phenomenon of slavery and other types of strong asymmetrical dependency from methodologically and theoretically distinct perspectives.

Much of late Roman written law is, famously, status-based, but gender-neutral. Because both men and women could hold citizenship and property, in theory women had access to legal procedure to defend their interests in the same way as men, as long as they were free. Nonetheless, we know remarkably little about female agency in late Roman legal procedure. This may be because the frequent genderneutral language of Roman legal writing has led modern scholars to prioritise the perspectives of men, and because contemporary moralising literature tends to downplay or denigrate female agency and needs to be read against the grain. It may, however, also be due to gender differentiation in legal practice. This workshop brings together classicists, historians, theologians, legal scholars and scholars of Judaism to investigate potential scenarios and loci of conflict resolution through which late antique women of different types and status could access or facilitate justice, or were denied doing so, from the courtroom proper to the household to religious communities. In particular, we aim to recover the role some women may have played as informal legal patrons, negotiators and arbitrators of justice for their dependents.
